WOODY BIOMASS WORKSHOP

Santa Fe, N.M. —Although the temperature is still hovering in the 90s, the Forest Guild and its partners are already thinking about next winter's heating costs, and more importantly, about how to lower future heating costs through the use of woody biomass as a sustainable, renewable, local energy resource. They will hold the Woody Biomass Thermal Energy Workshop in Santa Fe on Monday, August 3 and Tuesday, August 4 at the Santa Fe Community College.



"It will provide participants real world information about using woody biomass to heat schools, hospitals, and government and commercial buildings in New Mexico," says Mike DeBonis, Interim Director of the Forest Guild.

"We know that many of the forests near New Mexico towns are unnaturally crowded with smaller trees that present a fire risk," adds Dr. Zander Evans, Forest Guild Research Director. "This workshop presents an opportunity to think about the other side; that is, how can we use the trees we cut to heat our communities in a climate-friendly way?"

The workshop will provide useful information and answers about four important questions when considering woody biomass heating systems: Where is the wood and is it available? What combustion technology options are available? How much do systems cost and are there financial incentives available for installing woody biomass heating systems? And finally, what are the air quality concerns and are permits required?

Workshop participants will have opportunities to network with community leaders, facility managers, and workshop presenters. At the end of the workshop, participants will leave with the information and resources needed to make informed decisions about how to heat their buildings with woody biomass.

The low-cost, high-value workshop is open to facilities managers of government and commercial buildings, schools, and hospitals; green builders, contractors, and architects; local and state policymakers; and the general public.
